MOODY'S REMOVES NEGATIVE OUTLOOK

Lower Makefield Township, PA benefits from its close proximity to the City of Philadelphia (A2/STA) and the Township's large tax base is poised for further growth in light of ongoing commercial and residential development. Moreover, the Township's financial position has stabilized and is expected to continue to improve due to its perspective sewer system sale. The sale is expected to materially reduce the township's debt burden and eliminate the need for any additional governmental support of the utility, which had pressured operations in previous years.

On February 12, 2021 Moody's affirmed Lower Makefield Township's general obligation rating at Aa2. The negative outlook has been removed. For full report please visit www.lmt.org.



2020 DVT RISK MANAGEMENT INNOVATION AWARD WINNER – LOWER MAKEFIELD TWP.

In January of each year, the Delaware Valley Trusts' Executive Director and Risk Control Department staff select a single winner from the risk management innovation award applications/nominations collected throughout the year. This annual program which had its first winner in 2011 seeks to highlight examples of "out-of-the-box" thinking by DVPLT and DVWCT members.

We are very pleased to announce that Lower Makefield Township was selected to receive the 2020 award for their submission entitled, "The Public Works and Recreation Departments Employee Training Incentive Program". The origins of this innovation can be traced to when management identified a critical need to expand the range of employee skills and capabilities to increase productivity within the departments while maintaining the current headcount.

As a result, management in concert with the labor union collaborated to implement a process whereby employees could earn increased compensation by meeting targeted competencies, many of which included risk management elements. Some of these competencies require the attainment of specific certifications, while others require employees to pass a department head review and approval. Each competency attained awards an additional level of compensation.

In addition to the risk management benefits, this innovation was selected in part because it is an excellent example of what is possible when management and labor work together to improve the work environment. Feedback indicates the program has been well-received by employees who appreciate the clarity in how they might progress in their job classifications. Management benefits by having employees with a greater skill-set. This initiative has been especially helpful to address absences during critical operational periods.

As a result of winning the 2020 DVT Risk Management Innovation Award, Lower Makefield Township will receive a recognition plaque, catered luncheon for the project team, and \$1,000 prize to be used to help fund the program.

The Township has graciously agreed to share its Employee Training Incentive Program with DVPLT and DVWCT members. 

Spring "Ephemeral" Wildflowers at the Five Mile Woods Preserve

Spring will always be a time of new beginnings. Whether or not you enjoy the winter months, it is hard not to appreciate the dramatic fashion in which winter's cold days and long





It turns out, the earliest weeks of spring represent a lucrative time period for a group of wildflowers known as "spring ephemerals." These are species that have made evolutionary adaptations in their lifecycle - essentially becoming "sprinters" - that help them capitalize on early spring's fleeting riches. To explain why, we must take a step back and recognize that flowers do not bloom for *our* enjoyment! They bloom because it is a critical step in the plant producing the seeds that will perpetuate the species population. To produce seeds, these immobile plants must somehow share genetic material with other plants in the vicinity. This is

creatively achieved by tricking pollinators into running the delivery service! In nature, it is often said that there is no such thing as a free lunch. Yet wildflowers offer just that to pollinating insects, advertising the opportunity for free nectar via each species uniquely designed, colored and scented bloom! It is trickery in the most shameless form, as in partaking in the free meal, the pollinators end up dispersing pollen from flower to flower, making fertilization and seed production possible. For the wildflowers, the entire process from sprouting to eventual seed production demands abundant energy resources.

Which brings us back to early spring. As lingering snows melt away and the ground finally thaws, the lengthening day and more direct angle of the sun blankets the forest floor with springs most precious commodity: direct sunlight itself. *Precious energy* that requires a sprinters pace to take advantage of before the trees towering overhead leaf-out themselves, allowing mere scraps of light to reach the forest floor throughout the remainder of the growing season. All plants need sunlight to create energy via photosynthesis, and access to *direct* sunlight has its obvious advantages. For plants that grow on the forest floor, this is only possible in early spring.

There are certainly flowering plant species that have adapted to "second fiddle" roles in the shady conditions more typical of the forest floor. But that has required that they adopt more of a "marathon" slow-but-steady approach to development and reproduction. This in turn exposes them to the hazards of drought, disease or - far to commonly - herbivory from animals like white tailed deer.

Spring ephemeral are neither that patient nor persistent, but their ambitious "sprinting" strategy is not without its risks either. *Ephemeral* is defined as "lasting for a very short time," and spring ephemerals are truly brief in their appearance. Not only is the period the plant is actually in bloom brief. For many species the entire plant itself will fade or even disappear after seeding, dying back entirely to its rootstock of stored energy reserves for the following spring. By June, you might no longer see evidence above the ground that spring ephemerals plant existed at all. They are essentially putting all their eggs in one early-season basket, betting against late-season snows or early season flooding and counting on the availability of early season pollinators. It is a strategy that works! And it is a sight for our sore eyes after a long and dreary winter.

Common native spring ephemerals in the Five Mile Woods Preserve, in roughly the order they appear, include Spring Beauty (Clytonia virginica), Common Violet (Viola sororia), Yellow Trout Lily (Erythronium americium), Bloodroot (Sanguinaria canadensis), Jewelweed (Impatiens capensis) and Mayapple (Podophylum peltatum). In fact, I am compelled to give a nod to the lowly Skunk Cabbage (Symplocarpus foetidus) as our earliest bloomer! While not typically considered a "wildflower," it's dark-colored, heat absorbing "spathe" can be seen pushing through lingering snows as early as February! The small, hooded spathe serves as a mini greenhouse within which a round "spadix" will eventually bloom. Truly an evolutionary wonder in applied design.

For better and often for worse, these species are joined by a number of early blooming "alien" species, including Lesser Celendine (*Ficaria Vera*) and garlic mustard (*Alliaria petiolate*). Some of these may be attractive, and they do provide another source of nectar for pollinators. But they also crowd out our native wildflowers and disrupt our assemblages of native plant species.

Spring can happily overwhelm us with its sudden burst of warmth, colors and available outdoor activities. Next time you are out and about, especially if you are strolling through a natural woodland forest like Lower Makefield Township's Five Mile Woods Preserve, take some time to appreciate one of the seasons most amazing displays of evolutionary genius: Spring ephemerals lighting up the forest floor in a ritual as old as spring itself.

Road Paving Progress

Over \$642,000 was approved by the Board of Supervisors for road paving and repairs of Township Roads for the 2021 season.

The 2021 Road Paving Project, which involves milling, selected base repair, and final roadway paving with curb ramps, where necessary, was awarded at the March 3, 2021 Board of Supervisors meeting. Bids were received and opened on February 11, 2021 and the project was awarded to Harris Blacktopping, Inc which includes the base bid as well as three bid alternates.

The base bid includes Effingham Road, Ovington Road, Radcliffe Road, Shelly Lane (east of Westover Road), Shelly Lane (west of Yardley Road), Tudor Lane, Vernon Lane (off of Yardley Road), Vernon Lane (off of Westover Road), Westover Road, Friar Drive, Teich Drive, Trend Drive, Wynnewood Drive, and Black Rock Road from the canal to Ardsley Road. The bid alternates awarded include James Court, Inverness Drive and Silo Road (from Harvest Drive to Cultipacker Road). All awarded roads are to be milled and overlaid with new wearing coarse asphalt.

ADA curb ramps and stormwater inlet repairs are also incidental to the project. The total length of Township Roads to be paved in the 2021 road paving program is 3.84 miles.

20th Year Commemoration of September 11th Events

On September 11, 2001 our country was forever changed by a series of unprecedented events. That day 2,977 people were killed in a series of targeted attacks. The World Trade Center in New York City, The Pentagon in Washington DC, and an empty field in Shanksville became the battlefields where thousands perished and thousands of acts of valor occurred and responding to these despicable acts.

As our shocked and saddened country processed the events, a group of residents from Lower Makefield Township who lost loved ones in the attacks looked for a way to remember and honor them. Eighteen residents of Bucks county and nine from Lower Makefield Township were lost during these attacks, the highest losses throughout

Pennsylvania. The 9-11 Memorial Garden of Reflection was created in Memorial Park on Woodside Road to honor those lost and is both a Bucks County and Pennsylvania's Official state 9/11 Memorial. Since its dedication in 2006, this Memorial has been a place of community gathering and healing.

This September marks the 20th year of the attacks on 9/11. As in past years, there will be two ceremonies that will be open to the public. A morning ceremony will mark the chronological time of the events as they occurred on that fateful morning. Community members and clergy will speak to honor those lost and to offer comfort to families and our community. Ceremonial tolling of bells and a wreath laying



ceremony are also being planned as part of the mornings' ceremony.

The "Remembrance in Light" Ceremony returns to The Garden of Reflection for the 20th commemoration of the September 11th events at 7pm. As the darkness of the night progresses, a light will be brought to the ceremony with the inclusion of candle lighting, music, and the rising of the fountains bringing us hope on one of the darkest days in American history. The beautiful twin fountains are the backdrop to this ceremony which will culminate with attendees being invited to place a flower at the glass panels listing names of the victims at the ceremony's conclusion.

One of the most powerful images in the aftermath of the attacks, were the thousands of messages, photos and flags that became makeshift memorials. Each one moving and taken together, sent a powerful message of a search for restoration, hope and remembrance. During this 20th Year Commemoration, The Garden of Reflection will provide a "Wall of Remembrance" for visitors to write on and leave their lasting messages of restoration, hope and remembrance. We invite all to visit and share the week leading up to September 11th.
