

# Commission for Accreditation of Parks and Recreation Agencies

#### **CAPRA Accreditation**

Since 2019 Lower Makefield Township Parks and Recreation has been working toward Commission for Accreditation of Parks and Recreation Agencies (CAPRA). This June the Township was visited by the CAPRA Review Team that consisted of reviewers from North Carolina, Virginia, and Texas to assess the Department on 154 standards. The Township met all 115 of 118 non-fundamental standards and met all 36 fundamental standards. Lower Makefield Parks and Recreation met 97% of the non-fundamental standards, a first-year accredited agency is only required to meet 90%.

In September the Township Park Director and Operations Manager will attend a virtual hearing where they will present to the CAPRA review board along with their Review team leader for a

final vote on accreditation of our Township. At the National Recreation and Parks Conference new Accredited Agencies will be announced.

CAPRA HISTORY: "The CAPRA standards were developed by a special committee initiated in 1989 by the American Academy for Park and Recreation Administration (AAPRA) and the National Recreation and Park Association (NRPA). The standards and accreditation process were field tested at park and recreation agencies of varying characteristics. In 1993, the Commission for Accreditation of Park and Recreation Agencies (CAPRA) was established to implement and administer agency accreditation. Since then, the CAPRA standards have been reviewed and revised several times, notably in 1996, 2001, 2009, 2014 and 2019. The current CAPRA Standards are evaluated on a continuous basis to maintain relevance to the industry and published annually." (CAPRA ACCREDIDATION HANDBOOK)

#### **POOL**

The 2022 season marked a return to special events and regular hours. The summer kicked off with League Day which allowed our leagues throughout Lower Makefield Township to enjoy a preview of the pool before opening weekend.

This marked the first year of the League Day event which was an opportunity for the leagues to have the pool to themselves to celebrate their season. It also provided the staff a practice day before the regular season.

As a result of COVID-19 shutdowns there is a lifeguard shortage across the United States. In 2021 many pools could not open and LMT did not escape the shortage, often the pool was operating with limited hours. As a result, the pool closed from 3-4 daily and amenities were closed on occasion due to the shortages.

In response to the shortage leadership at LMT approved a raise across the board for summer staff and a full-time year-round Pool Manager position. This allowed the pool management to be better trained and alleviated pressure from other department staff who were doing backend preparation ahead of pool season.

This did not come without pain points. It became imperative early on that there would have to be a rate increase for patrons to cover the staff wage increase. In order to make this more palatable Township Administrators proposed a plan to accommodate some of the past complaints about registration by creating an A LA CARTE membership instead of the historic family registration.

By doing this the pool did not experience the shortages that the rest of the country was dealing with and allowed us to provide even more programming options.

This year with a new full-time manager in position staff received better training than ever. The manager a certified Lifeguard Instructor Trainer certified four members of the leadership team as American Red Cross Lifeguard Instructors (LGI). Having LGIs on staff will allow LMT Pool to maintain an internal training program that includes regular in-service trainings and gives LMT the opportunity to hold community lifeguard trainings onsite.

Lifeguard staff are required to attend an average of four hours of in-service training per month. Topics include; fitness swimming and drills, water rescue scenarios, and team CPR. Leadership has also been diligent in conducting regular audits to ensure staff are prepared in the event of an

emergency. These audits occur during regular operating hours and are often very visible. Members have been incredibly receptive to these audits and been very complimentary of staff skills and the team's commitment to safety.

## **Summer Camp**

Due to high demand in 2021 for summer camp staff began looking for an offsite locations that could potentially be the new home or an additional home for Camp LMT. Staff evaluated and reached out to

schools, halls, and churches to determine if there was adequate available space for our needs. This turned out to be a larger challenge than expected and staff were left to brainstorm alternatives.... For 2022, the result was the installation of a temporary tent behind the Community Center that had air conditioner units.

With the tent in place 2022 Summer Camp was a hit, campers spent a lot of time in the tent and doing crafts and participating in activities. By adding the tent into our facilities arsenal staff had the flexibility to accommodate 45 more campers weekly. While this was a great temporary solution the Park staff will continue to investigate indoor spaces for the future.

#### **Tween Adventures**

As a result of the community needs assessment completed in early 2022, there was a glaring need to provide more opportunities for the Tween and Teen population. As a result, staff

developed a pilot program called Tween Adventures. The first year goal was set to reach a minimum of 20 Tween Campers to participate in the program. Understanding that word of mouth will assist with future registration particularly for the Tween population. Midsummer 21 campers registered for the program. This Tween Adventures program differs in the fact that it is less structured and there is more opportunity for choices throughout the day.

Tweens are one of the more underserved populations in Lower Makefield Township which became evident when programing was evaluated. It will be a goal of the Township to partner closely with Pennsbury School District and surrounding municipalities to offer more programs and safe spaces to go in their free time.

## **Facility Rentals**

#### **Pavilions (Kids Kingdom and Memorial Park**

Residents can reserve two pavilions in the Township, one at Memorial Park near the Secret Garden and one at Community Park near Kids Kingdom. These rentals have been consistent until 2021 when everyone wanted to schedule everything outside to offer safe functions. We have had meetings, fundraisers, small events, graduation parties, school district PTO events, birthday

parties, you name it, there have been requests. Pavilions have become a hot commodity in the parks in 2021 and are continuing to grow in popularity.

#### **Community Center Room Rentals**

Since opening in 2018 the Community Center has been rented for community events, nonprofit, fundraisers, scout functions and league meetings. There are a few groups who have longer term arrangements to use the community center as a home for the next year including the LMT Seniors, the Newtown Quilters Guild, Daughters of the American Revolution. Now with programming taking off, seniors starting to gain more members since the pandemic, and reservations continue to gain more popularity we are looking at the Community Center being fully operational with heavy usage.
