Statistics: Date: May – October 2023

In 2022 the Community Needs Assessment Identified that there as a need for more Arts and Culture in the Parks and was added to the Play for all Plan as an area to address. As a follow up AOY Art Center and the Parks and Recreation Department put their heads together to find a way to imbed Art within the Parks. After reaching out to Seward Johnson Atelier located next to the Grounds for Sculpture we identified a project partner that would allow the Township to host sculptures for a six-month period within the parks. The theme of the project is the vision of the Parks Department "Play for All."



Weather: Art in the Park was a 6-month program from May to October. During the months of June, July, and August the Township faced poor air quality and multiple rainstorms causing 3 events to be cancelled. The pickleball demo had a rain date and was also rained out for the rain date causing it to be ultimately cancelled. The weather did have a impact on Art in the Park. Overall, most of the events had good weather and had a great turn out.

Positives:

- Helped promote activity to residents who may not typically come out to a Lower Makefield Park

Things to consider.

It would be beneficial to develop a full comprehensive Arts and Culture Plan before moving forward with another year of Art in the Park. The department was short staffed with manning this program. Although this did reach many residents and did a positive for the community at low cost it is a lot to manage with a small number of staff. With a well-developed plan and getting community partners and volunteers involved this can be more manageable.

About this Report

A survey was sent out to the community after Art in the Park concluded. Of the responses 85% are Lower Makefield Township Residents. The majority of responses come from the 56+ age group with 51% of responses and following that is 46-55 year old age group with 25% of respondents.

- There is always room for more







Did you participate in Art in the Parks this year? 68 responses









If yes, what did you participate in?

68 responses




Do you think Art in The Park is worth having again? 68 responses

Displaying artwork with trite content does a disservice to both the community and the arts as a whole.

- I planned to attend a docent walk thru of the sculptures in Memorial Park but it was the day I think July 15 of the massive, massive rain that caused dangerous flooding. I think it should have been rescheduled. I did not attend, and I regret I wasn't able to, as I didn't realize the Steward Johnston sculptures were only temporary.

Just a suggestion . . .look to Lawrence NJ for some ideas. I don't think they do anything major, but look up "Lawrenceville Main Street". They seem to have some successful programs like the ones you are looking to do. Free concerts with vendors? Maybe a student exhibition? A crafter or makers event? Maybe sculpture on a walking path/woods, instead of spread out through the township? This could be local artists or something on loan, but does not need to be a big name like Johnson. Get people to a park that is less known or used. Maybe have it over one weekend and charge for parking and/or entry to offset the cost.
