In 2024, the Lower Makefield Township Department of Parks and Recreation achieved significant milestones, enhancing the community's recreational opportunities and green spaces. Key highlights included increased participation in diverse programs for all age groups, playground upgrades, and improved basketball courts. The department launched new initiatives focusing on engaging teens, tweens, and seniors. Signature events like the Veterans Day Parade and Camp LMT saw strong attendance, while ongoing projects such as the Dog Park and expanded pickleball offerings continued to thrive. 


Park and Recreation Department Performance

Expenses: Maintained 60% of the budget due to project delays and efficient cost management.


Year-over-Year Growth: 6% increase in revenue, even when excluding light cost recovery.

ADA Transition Plan

Lower Makefield Township remains committed to making all parks accessible to all residents. In the past year, several projects were completed to enhance accessibility:



Secret Garden Accessable Playground

Upgraded with new surfacing, fencing, paint and replacing broken equipment.



Five Mile Woods

Installed an ADA Accessible Path, installed Accessible Parking, installed a new pathway from the Parking to the entryway to the trail.



Heacock Tot Lot

Installed a walking path from the sidewalk to the play equipment.

In 2025 we intend to review the ADA Transition Plan and incorporate programming and marketing into the document and do a fresh inventory of the parks.

Asset Management

Asset management in Lower Makefield Township's Parks and Recreation Department ensures the sustainability, safety, and efficiency of recreational facilities, parks, and amenities. By systematically tracking assets like playgrounds, athletic fields, trails, and infrastructure, the department enhances residents' recreational experiences while maximizing asset lifespan and value.

Macclesfield Park Master Plan

Lower Makefield Township continued developing the Macclesfield Park Master Plan to address safety, congestion, and overuse. JMT collected public feedback which including focus groups, an open house, a survey, and a public meeting to identify solutions for community and league needs, including ball fields and support facilities.









Play For All Progress

Stewardship and Sustainability

Lower Makefield Township thanks the Environmental Advisory Council and the Friends of Five Mile Woods for their leadership in sustainability efforts. With the help of dedicated volunteers, the Township planted trees across multiple parks, improved accessibility with a new boardwalk, enhanced biodiversity through native plantings, and maintained trails to support habitat restoration.

In 2024, Lower Makefield Township transitioned from MeetUp to CourtReserve, a more user-friendly app that allows staff to provide better backend support.



Additionally, a new Pickleball Club was launched, offering member perks such as discounted clinic and event rates, quarterly socials, and an exclusive members-only newsletter.



A court reservation system was also introduced to improve accessibility and organization.

Programs Summer Camp

Camp LMT 2024 experienced a successful season with record enrollment and revenue, welcoming more campers than ever. The camp introduced enhanced staffing and programming, fostering greater community engagement through various trips and activities. Despite minor challenges, leadership ensured a memorable experience for all attendees.

Pool Performance

- **Revenue**: Reached 79% of the budget, with 48% supplemented by an interfund transfer from Parks & Recreation.
- **Challenges**: Membership remained below target, and interest earnings underperformed due to a lower cash balance.
- **Expenses**: Came in at 75% of the budget, with savings from the absence of a pool manager and lower spending.
- **Year-over-Year Performance**: 2% revenue increase (excluding interfund transfer), with cost-cutting measures improving overall financial stability.



Pool Highlights

The Lower Makefield Township Pool remained a top summer destination in 2024, offering swim programs, special events, and a safe, family-friendly environment. Ongoing improvements and dedicated staff ensured a successful season.

Benefits of swim lessons

Swim lessons at The Pool equip residents with essential water safety skills, reducing the risk of drowning by up to 88% (CDC). By providing accessible instruction for all ages, the program builds confidence in the water, promotes lifelong safety habits, and strengthens community well-being.

Seasonal employment at The Pool provides valuable job opportunities, especially for first-time workers, fostering responsibility, teamwork, and leadership skills. These positions support pool operations, ensuring a safe and enjoyable experience for the community while offering local youth and residents meaningful employment close to home.
