

DEATH WAS NATURAL

So Said the Jury in the Inquest Over the Exhumed Budy of Margaret Devlin.

CUT MADE IN EMBALMING

The Kyldence Only Brought Forth th Fact That Because the Neighbors Were Not Told All the Particulars They Recame Suspicious."

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The coroner's inquest over the exemumed body of Margaret Devlin, of Stony Hill, near Yardley, was held at that place this morning, and resulted in a verdict of "death from natural causes."

It appears from the evidence of the several witnoses sworn this morning that Margaret/Devlin led a very exclusive life, and the people with whom she lived had not informed any of their neighbors as to Mis. Devlin's illness or death.

As soon as Mrs. Devlin died her soo who was superintending the building of a trolley line near Williamsport, was telegraphed for, and he came at once. Mr. Devlin came to Trenton immediately after he reached Stony-H2ll and secured Mr. James Murphy to take charge of the funeral. Mr. Murphy sent his embalmers to Stony Hill and had the body properly taken care of, and the gash on Margaret Devlin's breast is the one made-by the embalmer in the bourse of his work. At the inquect held this morning hy Coroner Kunsman, of Morriville, consisted of Edward Wright, foreman, of Morrisiville; John B. Stockton, Joseph D. E. M. Lloyd, Henry Stackhouse and S. B. Willard.
